Burglary Reduction Officer shortlisted for national award





A burglary reduction officer who worked tirelessly to secure hundreds of victims' homes against repeat break-ins has been shortlisted for a national award.

It comes after PCSO Amardeep Sandhu supported 400 residents to claim free Ring doorbells, CCTV cameras, motion sensor lighting and locks for windows and doors as part of the Safer Streets project in the Arboretum, Radford and The Park around this time last year.

Since then, not one of those homes has been targeted by burglars again. And in the wider surrounding area as a whole, burglary fell by a total of 43% after the project. Read the full story here.

A man convicted of manslaughter who turned his life around after meeting his victim's parents said helping young people to navigate their emotions is key to breaking the cycle of violence.

Jacob Dunne said: "It's hurt people that hurt people – and so if we create environments to support people to have healthy relationships with themselves, I would say they are automatically less likely to want to go around hurting people,

Project guiding troubled youth offenders through custody



The Divert Plus project aims to have an impact while a young person is in police custody or within 24 hours of their release - a crucial time when they may be more open to accepting help and support.

They work closely with the speech and language therapy service to ensure young offenders have the essential services needed to fully understand the judicial process and the consequences of their actions.

Victims of crime to shape future service


"Services should be more victim led by listening to what victims need."
