COUNCIL TAX Information 2020 - 2021

We start the new year with 147 more police officers, benefitting every community in the County and the City.

Following last year's investment in targeted police teams, knife crime is coming down across the County by 8%, with the City seeing a reduction of 18%. Burglary, vehicle crime, sexual offences and violence with injury are also reducing, bucking the national trend.

This year's budget will bring more officers, working to tackle organised crime in neighbourhoods; more robbery and knife crime teams; a focus on online and digital crime; environmentally friendly cars; and

more support for victims of crime. The work to prevent violence will be stepped up, with more community and early intervention initiatives.

Reducing crime is a matter for all of us, not just the police and I value our relationships with our many partners in criminal justice agencies, the voluntary sector and our local authorities.

I know that people want to see more police and less crime in their communities. I understand that. That's why we have focussed so much effort on recruitment of new officers and making sure that those officers are out there, in neighbourhoods, tackling the crimes that matter most to our residents.

Budget for policing

The net budget requirement for policing Nottinghamshire in 2020-21 has been set at £221.6m, of which £73.5m comes from the policing portion of the council tax. This is £15.3m up on the 2019-20 figure, of which £12.5m relates to uplift grant and the costs associated with recruiting an additional 107 officers.

The increase in the amount of council tax paid towards policing depends on the Band of the property.

The Police and Crime Commissioner

As Commissioner I hold the police to account on your behalf, providing a link between the public and your police force. I also commission a number of services to improve community safety and support the recovery of victims of crime. I consult with the public to find out what matters most to you, set the overall police budget and appoint the Chief Constable.

PCCs are not responsible for operational policing such as crime investigation or the day-to-day management of police officers, PCSOs and staff. This is entirely the role of the Chief Constable. I do, however, set local priorities for the police and our community safety partners through my Police and Crime Plan.
