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1. Legislation

<u>Modern slavery white paper published</u> - A flagship Bill to tackle modern slavery, the first of its kind in Europe, has been published by the Home Secretary Theresa May.

SI 2014 No. 239 The Police Act 1997 (Criminal records) (Amendment) Regulations 2014 This statutory instrument was laid before Parliament on 13 February and comes into force on 10 March. It concerns fees for criminal conviction certificates.

Local Government Innovation Taskforce report sets out costs and failure of centralisation

The interim report of the Local Government Innovation Taskforce, "The Case for Change", commissioned as part of Labour's Policy Review, says that the Tory-led Government is failing to deliver on its promise of localism and that Labour must decentralise power to help communities deal with social and economic change.

Sir Stephen Bubb, Chief Executive of the Association of Chief Executives of Voluntary Organisations, has criticised this Government's public service reform programme as emphasising "narrow cost savings" at the expense of "engagement, collaboration and social value". In a letter to the Financial Times, Mr Bubb identified opening up services to private sector involvement as a key factor, writing "The public sector monopolies that you were so keen to break open have been threatened by new private sector oligopolies" (*F2*).

Concerns have been raised following evidence that hospital records are being used by private firms to advise companies how to target their marketing. The concerns over the alleged misuse of the Hospital Episodes Statistics data coincides with ongoing debates over the safety of care.data records (*Telegraph*).

Councils in England have planned a slight increase in council tax, amounting to a 0.6 rise on average, according to a survey by the Chartered Institute of Public Finance and Accountancy (<u>BBC Online</u>).

An EU directive will cost UK businesses over 1.2 billion per year, according to the Regulatory Policy Committee's annual report. Although the Government has a policy of balancing the cost of new regulation with cuts to red tape elsewhere, the cost of implementing the "Alternative Investment Fund Managers Directive" is predicted to far outstrip the money saved by such measures (FT).

A report by the Family and Childcare Trust has found that, on average, families are spending more on childcare costs than mortgage payments. According to the report, parents are paying £7,500 a year for part-time childcare with costs having risen by 27 per cent since 2009 (*Telegraph; Guardian; Mail; BBC Online*).

Analysis by the UK Commission for Employment and Skills has found that many will be delaying their retirement until their 70s or 80s. The report by the Commission also identified a range of future changes to the workplace: technology will accelerate change throughout the working environment, multi-media visual work will become the norm and the size of core workforces will fall as companies rely more heavily on networks or freelances (*Telegraph*).

HMIC announces new programme of annual inspections

Making best use of police time

<u>Terms of reference for the investigation into the conduct of three Police Federation</u> <u>representatives</u>.

HMIC: Crime Data Integrity. This inspection will examine the effectiveness of the police in dealing with reports of crime by members of the public. The scope is subject to development but is likely to build on the findings of HMIC's previous inspections in this area. Scoping work will include consultation with the Crime Statistics Advisory Committee.

HMIC: Domestic Violence: On 9 September, the Home Secretary commissioned HMIC to look at the effectiveness of the police response to cases of domestic violence and abuse. Started for Nottinghamshire on the 4 November. This is a Home Secretary commissioned Thematic due to be completed by April 2014.
