# Commissioner's horizon scanning briefing

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## **1. Policy and Practice**

## Sentencing Guideline for guilty pleas: the risks – 14<sup>th</sup> June 2016

Justice Committee report warns that the Sentencing Council's guideline on reducing sentences for guilty pleas could lead to longer prison terms in some cases which would impact upon the prison population. Given the difficulties in estimating the resource implications, the Council proposes to conduct an impact assessment in 2017. The report also highlights the impact of systemic and personal pressures to plead guilty which are capable of extending to the factually innocent and vulnerable defendants – such as those with learning difficulties or mental health conditions.

<u>Children and young people's mental health – policy, services, and funding</u> – 22<sup>nd</sup> June 2016 Commons briefing paper outlines government strategy and funding relating to mental health for young people

Financial sustainability of local authorities: Capital expenditure and resourcing – 15<sup>th</sup> June 2016 National Audit Office report concludes that local authorities have kept up levels of capital spending but face pressure to meet debt costs and maintain investment in existing assets.

<u>Guide to business rate retention: What localised business rates mean for your council</u> – 23<sup>rd</sup> June 2016 LGA briefing explores Government policy to enable councils to retain 100% of business rates by 2020 and work to explore a needs-led system of redistribution across the whole of local government.

# <u>New procurement e-learning package developed to help tackle bid-rigging</u> – 20<sup>th</sup> June 2016

The Competition and Markets Authority (CMA) and the Crown Commercial Service have developed a new <u>tool</u>, <u>60-second summary</u> and <u>video</u> to help procurers understand why bid-rigging is harmful, spot signs that suggest a bid may be illegal and deal with suspected rigged bids.

# IPCC 'Focus' - Issue Nine - 20th June 2016

IPCC practical guidance on handling complaints and conduct matters within the Police Reform Act 2002. <u>Latest</u> <u>issue</u> outlines statutory guidance on making a referral, death or serious injury matters, serious corruption, serious assault, discrimination and voluntary referrals.

## 2. Research, Development and Statistics

## Study demonstrates the value of investing in proactive foot patrols in hotspot areas - 15<sup>th</sup> June

A year-long University of Cambridge criminology study in Peterborough found that targeting 34 crime 'hot spot' areas with 21 minutes extra PCSO foot patrol per day is likely to have prevented 86 assaults a year, or incidents of the equivalent crime 'harm value', saving potential costs to the public of eight years of imprisonment. The study applied the Cambridge Crime Harm Index to measure harm caused to victims based on the severity in sentencing for different offences and also made use of GPS devices embedded in the radios of PCs and PCSOs to track time spent in each location. The findings, published in the Journal of Experimental Criminology, indicate that investing in proactive PCSO foot patrols in crime 'hot spots' could yield a more than five-to-one return: with every £10 spent saving £56 in prison costs.

#### Examination of the impact of online pornography on children and young people – 15<sup>th</sup> June 2016

Middlesex University-led examination of the impact of online pornography on the values, attitudes, beliefs and behaviours of children and young people, commissioned by the Children's Commissioner for England and the NSPCC. Report identifies a marked increase experience of viewing online pornography between the ages of 11-12 (28%) and 15-16 (65%), with some older children wanting to act out the pornography they have seen.

## <u>Child sex offences involving the internet</u> – 21<sup>st</sup> June 2016

NSPCC findings based on police recorded crime data highlights that the internet was used as a gateway by offenders to commit more than 3,000 sex crimes against children over the last year. NSPCC also found that the number of offences cyber-flagged by police varies wildly across the country - an average of 8 crimes were reported a day with some forces recording hundreds of crimes over the space of a year, while others recorded fewer than 10. A small number of forces said they were not using, or were not aware of the cyber-flag.

## How safe are our children? – 21<sup>st</sup> June 2016

NSPCC report compiles up to date UK child protection data. The report shows that child cruelty and neglect cases recorded by police have increased by 75% over the last decade to around 8,500 a year. Greater public awareness and improvements in how police record offences are highlighted as potential influencing factors.

## 4. Reviews and Inquiries

## The Carlile Inquiry 10 years on 20<sup>th</sup> June 2016

Howard League report examines progress against recommendations from an independent inquiry into the use of restraint, solitary confinement and strip-searching on children which was led by Lord Carlile in 2006. The report concludes that while reductions in the number of children in custody have been positive, the majority of children are still detained in institutions where restraint is routinely used. There have been some improvements in the use of restraint, solitary confinement and strip-searching, however fundamental concerns remain and progress in implementing the recommendations of the 2006 inquiry has been slow and piecemeal.

## 5. Legislation

## Investigatory Powers Bill - Lords 2<sup>nd</sup> reading - 27<sup>th</sup> June 2016

Make provision about the interception, acquisition and retention of communications data and other bulk data for analysis and the use of equipment interference. Establish the Investigatory Powers Commissioner and other Commissioners and make provision about oversight arrangements; make further provision about investigatory powers and national security; amend s3 and s5 of Intelligence Services Act 1994. Due to be enacted in 2016 See Lords briefing paper (21<sup>st</sup> June 2016) and Joint Select Committee recommendations for further information

#### Policing and Crime Bill – Lords 1<sup>st</sup> reading - TBC

Make provision for Emergency Services Collaboration; Police complaints, discipline and inspection reform; changes affecting the police workforce, ranks and representative institutions; police powers, use of modern technology and PCCs; Firearms and alcohol licensing; system for pre-charge bail, combatting the sexual exploitation of children and other miscellaneous provisions. <u>Supporting documents</u> <u>Commons analysis paper</u>

## On-line Safety Bill – Lords 2<sup>nd</sup> reading - TBC

Private Members' Bill to require internet service providers (ISPs) to provide an internet service that excludes adult-only content; require information to be provided about online safety; make provision for parents to be educated about online safety; make provision for the regulation of harmful material through on-demand programme services; to introduce licensing of pornographic services

## Rehabilitation of Offenders (Amendment) Bill - Lords 2<sup>nd</sup> reading - TBC

Private Members' Bill to make provision about rehabilitation periods for particular sentences - amending Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974

## Prison and Courts Reform Bill - Announced 18th May 2016

Make provision for new 'reform prisons'; transformation of the prison education system; new performance metrics / League Tables; new prison-based counter extremism programme; 'secure alternative academies' for young offenders; problem-solving courts; expanded use of tags / satellite tracking and new arrangements for women offenders with children. Reform Courts and Tribunals to ensure delivery of faster and fairer justice for users by making better use of technology and modernising working practices.

## Counter-Extremism and Safeguarding Bill - Announced 18th May 2016

Prevent radicalisation, tackle extremism in all its forms, and promote community integration. Provide stronger powers to disrupt extremists and protect the public, ensure better mental health provision for individuals in the criminal justice system. Introduce a new civil order regime to restrict extremist activity, safeguard children from extremist adults through powers to intervene in intensive unregulated education settings which teach hate and drive communities apart, stronger powers for the Disclosure and Barring Service; close loopholes so that Ofcom can continue to protect consumers who watch internet-streamed television content from outside the EU on Freeview; consultation on powers to enable government to intervene where councils fail to tackle extremism. The Government will consider the need for further legislative measures following Louise Casey's review.

## Criminal Finances Bill - Announced 18th May 2016

Tackle corruption, money laundering and tax evasion. Allow the Government to recoup more criminal assets by reforming the law on proceeds of crime, including provisions to strengthen our enforcement powers and protect the public. Introduction of a criminal offence for corporations who fail to stop their staff facilitating tax evasion; Improve the operation of the Suspicious Activity Reports (SARs) regime to encourage better use of public and private sector resources against the highest threats; to target entities that carry out money laundering instead of individual transactions; and to provide the National Crime Agency (NCA) with new powers; Improve the ability of law enforcement agencies and courts to recover criminal assets more effectively, particularly in cases such as those linked to grand corruption.

## 6. Consultations

#### **BAME representation in the Criminal Justice System**

Call for evidence from victims, witnesses, offenders, Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME) communities, staff and other stakeholders on their views, experience and insights into BAME representation in the CJS. Evidence will be used to inform the Lammy Review into the over-representation of BAME groups at most stages of the criminal justice system, considering issues arising from the CPS involvement onwards - including the court system, in prisons and rehabilitation in the wider community.
