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1. POLICY AND PRACTICE

[Apply for funding: Places of Worship Security Fund – 8 June 2018](#)

Home Office opens bidding for a further £1m funding for places of worship that have been subjected to or could be vulnerable to hate crime attacks. Successful applicants will receive up to £56,000 towards improved security. The deadline for bids is 10 August 2018

[Updated counter-terrorism \(CONTEST\) strategy published – 4 June 2018](#)

Home Secretary [launches](#) the government's updated counter-terrorism strategy which takes account of the heightened and evolving threat and findings of a fundamental review of all aspects of counter-terrorism. The strategy remains structured around the four P's - aiming to **prevent** people becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism, **pursue** terrorists, **protect** against a terrorist attack and **prepare** in order to mitigate the impact of a terrorist attack. Strengthening the approach, the strategy also aims however to:-

- Disrupt terrorist threats in the UK earlier – including stronger powers for the Police and CPS
- Share information more widely and support more local interventions to tackle radicalisation
- Develop a more integrated relationship with the private sector – particularly in strengthening venue security, designing out vulnerability in infrastructure and gaining faster alerts to suspicious purchases
- Prioritise strengthening the resilience of local communities to terrorism
- Take the lead on international efforts to improve counter-terrorism globally

The counter-terrorism strategy will be underpinned by new legislation to amend existing terrorism offences to update them for the digital age, making it an offence to repeatedly view streamed video content online, strengthen the sentencing framework for terrorism and increase the maximum penalty for certain offences, and to enable further terrorism offences committed overseas to be prosecuted in the UK courts.

Government confirms plans to continue to develop the Digital Charter and publish a White Paper before the end of the year setting out more definitive steps on online harms and safety. The White Paper will draw together different aspects of Government work and consider new policy areas that were identified as part of the consultation, including: age verification to assist companies to enforce terms and conditions; policies aimed at improving children and young people's mental health, including the impact of screen time; tackling issues related to live-streaming; and, further work to define harmful content.

2. RESEARCH, DEVELOPMENT AND STATISTICS

Women most at risk of experiencing partner abuse – 31 May 2018

ONS analysis of CSEW findings between 2015 and 2017 highlights disparities in those experiencing partner abuse over a 12 month period among women who have a long-term illness or disability (12.4%) compared to those that do not (5.1%) and bisexual women (10.9%) compared with women that are not (6.0%). Higher rates of victimisation are also evident among women who identify with Mixed/Multiple ethnicities (10.1%), women living in households with an income of less than £10,000 (14.3%) and women living in social housing (11.1%).

Brief interventions for alcohol use disorders within criminal justice settings – 30 May 2018

College of Policing 'what works' crime reduction toolkit publishes findings from a systematic review of 10 studies which focus on the effectiveness of brief interventions to reduce re-arrest among adults and young people. Findings from 4 studies suggest that brief interventions for alcohol use disorders reduce crime, but do not have a statistically significant overall effect. The review identified a possible mechanism, the 'teachable moment', but did not test this.

Desperate for a Fix: shop theft and a Second Chance Programme – 6 June 2018

Centre for Social Justice report highlights the growing proportion of prolific offenders with substance abuse needs and makes proposals for a new intensive 'Second Chance' programme using shop theft as the trigger for tackling addiction and reducing other more serious offending. Includes a range of recommendations for PCCs

Stability Index 2018 – Published 1 June 2018

Children's Commissioner annual measure of the stability of the lives of children in care finds that most children in care continue to experience some kind of instability in one form or another, with only 1 in 4 that do not experience a placement move, school move or social worker change within a year.

Department of Health and Social Care review concludes that exemplar child sexual abuse and exploitation services are being delivered in the UK, albeit in selected areas and at a relatively small scale. The report notes that large scale delivery of services that recognise the whole-life impact of past and present trauma on an individual to achieve recovery are likely to represent a very good return on investment.

4. REVIEWS AND INQUIRIES

[Review of rape and serious sexual offences \(RASSO\) cases](#) – 5 June 2018

CPS publishes review of over 3,637 cases in England and Wales in which someone had been charged with rape or serious sexual assault following concerns in relation to how disclosure is handled by the CPS and the police. Common themes were identified based on findings from 47 RASSO prosecutions which had been stopped and were found to have issues with the disclosure of unused material. These included: communications evidence such as texts, emails and social media being examined too late in the process, the failure to identify and obtain material such as medical or social services records and the emergence of new evidence after charge. Action is already under way to address the issues identified in the review, which includes the extension of Disclosure Management Documents to all RASSO and Complex Crown Court cases to ensure disclosure issues are dealt with at an early stage; the introduction of Disclosure Champions in all CPS Crown Court and Magistrates' Court teams; new College of Policing training for all forces; a new procedure for officers to identify reasonable lines of enquiry when submitting a charging decision request to the CPS; and a new protocol between the CPS and police on the use of third party material.

[Assessment of the Sentencing Council's Drug Offences Guideline](#) – 1 June 2018

A small decrease in sentencing severity was observed in the 12 months following implementation of the guideline, alongside a more marked reduction in sentencing severity for the importation of class A drugs – where evidence suggests that coercion and exploitation are often associated factors. Further research is underway to examine evidence which suggests that some drug offending may be becoming more serious.

Government Bill to close gaps in existing counter-terrorism legislation, including provisions to:- extend the [offence](#) of inviting support for a proscribed organisation to cover reckless expressions of support, update the [offence](#) of obtaining information likely to be useful to a terrorist to cover material that is just viewed or streamed over the internet, [increase the maximum penalty](#) for certain preparatory terrorism offences to 15 years' imprisonment, [require Registered Terrorist Offenders to provide additional information to the police](#) in line with what Registered Sex Offenders must provide, add terrorism offences to the list of offences for which an individual can be subjected to a [Serious Crime Prevention Order](#), [amend the Terrorism Act 2000](#) so that the detention clock can be paused when a detained person is transferred from police custody to hospital, introduce a power to stop, question, search and detain an individual at a [port or border area](#) in order to determine whether they are, or have been, involved in hostile state activity
