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## 1. Legislation

### [Pensions Act 2014 has received Royal Assent.](#)

The Act contains a range of provisions to implement.

### [Defence Reform Act 2014 has received Royal Assent.](#)

This act enables the MOD to deliver better value for money for the taxpayer and to make the armed forces better able to meet the challenges of tomorrow.

### [Immigration Act 2014 has received Royal Assent.](#)

The Immigration Bill has received Royal Assent making way for a series of reforms which will ensure our immigration system is fairer to British citizens and legitimate migrants and tougher on those with no right to be here. The Immigration Act 2014 contains 77 clauses and makes fundamental changes to how our immigration system functions.

### **Community Trigger commencement date**

Following discussion with the Home Office there is confirmation that a commencement date of 13th May has been announced for the Community Trigger and Community Remedy. This is an administrative process that allows you to begin the consultation needed to prepare for these two powers. You do not have to have them in place by this date, or publish any

processes by this date. Both tools will commence at the same time as the rest of the tools on a date yet to be announced, but thought to be October.

Wolverhampton City Council has received a £493,000 grant from Police and Crime Commissioner Bob Jones to tackle violence, reduce gangs, and decrease the amount of drugs across the city. The funding comes after a council cabinet report stated that despite improvements in the area, public perception of crime was still negative.

Police Scotland has announced the appointment of four people to become members of their executive team in a time of 'significant change' for the force. The positions for the directors of Corporate Services, People and Development, Financial Services and ICT have been confirmed following an external recruitment process.

## [Force is not "doomed" but will be stretched in the wake of cuts, says chief constable.](#)

Roads policing and firearms officers in Essex Police face going through a selection process to remain in the roles – as the force cuts the number of specialist posts it has. As part of a move to put officers back on local policing units, Chief Constable Steve Kavanagh has announced that the force will be losing around 75 specialist officer roles this year. He also said the 325 officers trained in public order tactics – who currently work on other roles – will become 50 officers in a “specialist public order team”.

The number of opiate and crack cocaine users in England has fallen again according to independent research published today by Public Health England.

### [The Public Accounts Committee has published its report on the Criminal Justice System and Probation](#)

The Ministry of Justice is implementing wholesale changes to how rehabilitation services for offenders are delivered in England and Wales on a highly ambitious timescale. The committee recognised that the reform programme is still developing but noted risks arising from both the scale and pace of the reforms.

### [215,000 households in England at risk of eviction](#)

Research compiled by housing charity, Shelter, finds that between April 2013 and March 2014, 215,305 possession orders were issued across England. Data gathered from a Ministry of Justice census shows that many homeowners and private or social tenants

received possession notices during the 11 month period, amounting to the equivalent of 4,140 homes every week.

An inquiry into the Children's and Adolescent Mental Health Service (CAMHS) has found that a rise in mental health disorders amongst children is due to funding cuts and restructuring of services. Children's Commissioner for England, Maggie Atkinson, announced that more children and young people with mental health problems are being admitted to adult psychiatric wards than previously before. The Health Select Committee has received written evidence from councils and mental health services across England in response to an inquiry into the Children's and Adolescent Mental Health Service (CAMHS).

The Public Accounts Committee has published its report on reforms to the Criminal Justice System and Probation which, the committee says, "carry significant risks."

## **Tougher penalties to combat illegal working**

Employers could now face fines of up to £20,000 per illegal worker under new legislation. The changes also simplify the process for genuine employers: reducing the number of acceptable documents they may have to check, as well as the frequency with which these have to occur.

## **Major Projects Authority report shows improved project management**

The government has published the Major Projects Authority (MPA's) second annual report into the performance of 199 major projects with a forecast lifetime cost of £488 billion. It forms part of our commitment to improve project management and transparency and save taxpayers' money.

### **Proposed changes to guidance on domestic violence**

The Director of Public Prosecutions, Alison Saunders, has proposed changes to the way the CPS considers domestic violence cases and has published draft guidance, which is out for consultation, that explains the impact of domestic abuse on different groups to help prosecutors to adopt a tailored approach taking into account their particular support needs. The consultation is open until 9th July 2014.

### **Banning the sale of alcohol below the cost of duty plus VAT**

The Home Office has published guidance for suppliers of alcohol and local authorities in England and Wales for banning the sale of alcohol below the cost of duty plus VAT

### **Data policy for a Public Data Corporation**

### **Public Traffic Signs consultation**

The Department for Transport has launched a public consultation on proposed changes to the Traffic Signs Regulations and General Directions 2002. The consultation will close on 10 June 2014.

### **Schedule 7 Code of Practice**

The statutory Code of Practice provides guidance to examining officers on the application and interpretation of Schedule 7. These have had to be revised code to ensure they reflect the changes introduced in the ASBCP Act. These changes will maintain the protection of the UK border as well as continuing to respect individuals' human rights. ## [Draft Guidance on Police Post-incident Management](#)

The IPCC has produced additional statutory guidance on police post-incident management, designed to achieve best evidence in investigations of deaths or serious injury. The IPCC are seeking feedback on the draft guidance from stakeholders. The consultation is open until 27 May 2014.

## [Sentencing guidelines for theft](#)

The consultation on the draft guideline on theft offences is open from 3 April 2014 to 26 June 2014. The Council is seeking views on:

- the principal factors that make any of the offences included within the draft guideline more or less serious;
- the additional factors that should influence the sentence;
- the approach taken to structuring the draft guidelines;
- the types and lengths of sentences that should be passed for theft offences; and
- anything else that you think should be considered.

## 5. Reviews and Inspections

### [HMIC provides assurance that chief constables are having regard to the Strategic Policing Requirement – but finds that more needs to be done](#)

This inspection examined how well police forces have established the arrangements that the Strategic Policing Requirement requires them to have in place to counter a number of

specified threats to national security and public safety. It is based on data and documentary evidence provided by all 43 police forces in England and Wales in July 2013. It includes supporting fieldwork, conducted in 18 forces, and in nine Regional Organised Crime Units (ROCUs).
