Nottinghamshire's Police and Crime Commissioner

Nottinghamshire's Police and Crime Commissioner is Paddy Tipping, who was elected in November 2012 by the public of Nottingham and Nottinghamshire.

The Commissioner's job is to represent the public and to hold the police to account on their behalf. To help him do this he has appointed Chris Cutland as his Deputy.

The Commissioner does not run the Police Force; operational policing is the job of Chief Constable.

My Job

As your Police and Crime Commissioner my main aim is to ensure policing across Nottinghamshire and the City of Nottingham is efficient, effective and meeting your expectations.

My role involves a number of responsibilities which are designed to help me reflect your views on policing and enable me to champion victims of crime. They include:

- Setting the priorities for Nottinghamshire Police
- Putting the needs of victims first, ensuring appropriate support is available
- Consulting local people and victims, listening to their views and taking action in response
- Setting a budget that will fund both local and national priorities
- Monitoring the performance of the Force
- Working with partner agencies to tackle crime and reoffending
- Appointing (and if necessary dismissing) the Chief Constable
- Funding a wide range of services from Community Safety and victims' organisations
- Making sure that Police and Community Safety Services deliver value for money
- Publishing a Police and Crime Plan and Annual Report

Listening to You

Everything I do as your elected Commissioner is based on ensuring that Nottinghamshire receives a policing service that responds effectively to your communities' needs.

At the heart of that is listening to your experiences and representing your views on how policing works and where it needs to improve.

For example, when setting the annual budget for policing in Nottinghamshire, I also set the amount of council tax local people will pay towards policing. Before I do this, I ask local people what they are prepared to pay towards policing, which guides my decision.

What you have told me, along with my consultations with partners in your communities, has played a vital part in setting the direction for my first Police and Crime Plan, which aims to address local objectives. However, if things change, I can refresh the content at any time to reflect changing situations or needs.

We attend lots of local events and meetings where you can talk to me, or my Deputy Chris Cutland. Look out for details in the local papers and on my website.
